I suspect that many of the young people feel that they are immune from the effects of time. They don't appreciate time because there seems to be so much of it. Teenagers have a hard time thinking that they were ever like the little ones on their blankets on the floor, but they were. It is hard for them to imagine that one day they will be old like their parents beside them, or even more horrifying, like the grandparents. It's just a matter of time.



As we grow older we can see that time is like the sand in an hourglass running from the top glass to the bottom one, and as we see the final grains of sand remaining, we realize that indeed there is an end of time for us. But as Christians we live with the faith that when our time runs out, our hourglass

will be turned over again filled with the sands of eternity.

However, while we are on this earth, we are all subject to time. Ben Franklin said, "Don't waste time, that is the stuff life is made of." If you neglect education during the learning time of your life, you may pay dearly for it. Many want to quit school and get a job – get on with living because they fear there is not enough time to get it all in.

Perhaps this sense of never having enough time keeps us from doing the things that are the most important in life. Some people get the idea that they peak at 50 or 40 or even 20. **This attitude of "so little time" suffocates the human spirit.** Most people say that as you get old, you have to give up things. Because they act as if life were eternal, these people always feel that they have time to be available to others. You can read it in their faces and their posture. special moments. The occasion when people have released our spirit just by lending us a sympathetic half hour. Availability can be brief but it must be sincere to lift the spirit. 

As I said earlier, it takes a sense of eternity to make one realize that there is time, time to be available and to create.
