Do we give them an ultimatum, it's my way or the highway? It can be a very distressing time and can cause some hurt feelings that may take a long time to heal. What is a parent to do?

First of all, we need to mention a disclaimer. What you are

reading here is just some helpful thoughts and reminders. You as a parent know your child better than anyone else. Every child is different and what may work for one child may not work for another. The bottom line is it is your decision on how you handle your specific situation with your child. However, we are told to seek out a multitude of counsel (Prov. 11:14). It is our job to assist you in hopefully making wise choices.

We know about the scriptures in Deuteronomy that tell us to teach our children diligently the laws of God (Deut. 6:7). We also know our household, which includes our children, are to keep the Sabbath and there is no work to be done (Ex. 20:8-11). What



then do we do with the child who lives under our roof but refuses to go to church? What do you think the solution is?

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"Pass It On"

Do the people of the bible just jump off the page, full of life and personality to you, or like me, do you struggle sometimes forming a picture of what they were really like in flesh and blood?

What personality did a particular man or woman possess, what did they sound like and how did they carry themselves? What about their speech and inflection? Did they speak with a soft, but firm tone in a particular verse or was it sarcastic and mean? What kind of facial expressions did they have?

The bible text offers adjectives that describe how certain verses were spoken, but can you really hear words in your mind the way they were spoken? Here is an example: While my mother was visiting I was studying the patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Before bed one night my mother checked in on me and asked what I was reading. I read to her this verse in Genesis 42:38: "But Jacob said, 'My son will not go down there with you; his brother is dead and he is the only one left. If harm comes to him on the journey you are taking, you will bring my gray head down to the grave in sorrow."" (NIV)

My mother responded by giving a little laugh and asked what Jacob was talking about. She did not know Joseph's story, so I gave her a quick summary so she would have a better understanding of Jacob's reply to his son, Reuben. After hearing Joseph's story, my mother asked me to read the scripture verse again and then explained that I had made Jacob seem so real. I told her that the people in the bible were real people that actually walked and talked and lived and breathed.

The next day, as we entered a Christian bible store, my mother said she wanted to buy a devotional that would teach her who the people of the bible were and what they did that made such a difference that their lives were recorded for us to learn from today. She bought a daily devotional whose topic centers on men and women of the bible, and she looked at study bibles, as well.

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That approach can be very destructive.

If a child feels like they can come talk to you about anything they will. If they feel they will not be ridiculed for what they believe or feel, they will be willing to share with you what they are thinking. The parent has to be the one who keeps that door open and make sure the child knows they are there to listen and to advise accordingly if needed.



There is an admonition from Paul that says, "Do not provoke your children to wrath, but bring them up in the training and admonition of the Lord." (Eph. 6:4) It goes along with instructing our children to obey their parents. This communication is two way, the child honors the parent and the parent responds in a loving way. This is the ideal situation, however, the ideal situation is

not always reality. No matter the situation this is the standard we hope to attain and uphold.

Paul also says not to provoke our children because they could become discouraged (Col. 3:21). We may have made mistakes in the past concerning the Sabbath and church. We may have had nothing but rules that consist of what you can't do on the Sabbath instead of focusing in on what a delight the Sabbath can be (Isa. 58:13-14). Maybe the church has made the mistake in the past of not including our children and they lost interest. These matters can be fixed and there are some positive solutions to the problem.

In the meantime your child has grown and wants to move on. The only solution that seems to be reasonable is to give them the freedom to choose. We have to remember we are dealing with individuals who have not been given the gift of the Holy Spirit at this time. The danger of provoking them or threatening them is they may become completely turned off. That is not what we want and we don't want to place a stumbling block before them.

It is not easy stepping back and allowing them to choose on their own. None of us want to see our children go through pain and suffering. If we can keep an objective mind in dealing with this matter it may have a more lasting positive affect on them than the other way where we may separate ourselves from them. Our love for them never fails (1 Cor. 13:4-7). Our love for them bears all things and hopes all things. The hope is they will eventually come to the calling that waits for them.

"For the promise is to you and your children..."

Peter told the crowd on the Day of Pentecost that if they repented they would receive the gift of the Holy Spirit and the promise was not only for them but for their children (Acts 2:38-39). God never goes back on

In recent years, parents are becoming more concerned about modern music and its' influence on their children with its corrupt messages. Most music video and songs, not all, seems to focus on subject matters that are not appropriate to present in public. The outline of this article will be to cover the negative aspects on the matter then focus on the positive aspects of music. There are included at the end of this article a few tips on how you can assist your child in choosing music that is appropriate.

I, personally, listen to music from many generations such as Big Band (40s-50s), 60's music, easy listen such as Celt, and 80's rock music. This variety of music gives me a well rounded view of music. Many preteens and teens feel that only rap or hard rock is music, as my nephew stated to me a few years ago.



Many videos and song lyrics in recent years have been seriously deteriorating in various ways, which can have a great influence on the immature minds of children and teenagers who are still developing their concepts of the world around them.


The following **negative** themes are strongly promoted by many song lyrics and music videos:

- advocating and glamorizing abuse of drugs and alcohol
- Pictures and explicit lyrics presenting suicide as an "alternative" way out or as a solution
- Graphic violence like in many rap videos
- Preoccupation with the occult or other satanic concepts as entertainment
- Strong sexual concepts in lyrics and videos which promote violence to women, de-valuing of women, incest, homosexuality, and so forth.

The impact on the mind of negative messages in music heard constantly repeated, may cause the listener to act out the actions of the message in the music or at least cause the acceptance of this message as normal.

This puts great responsibility on the musical artist and record companies, because music can and does have a great influence on a child's behavior such as the way they think or dress or even the way that they speak.



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His promises. Paul said something similar when he was writing to the Corinthians; he said the children of a believer are no longer unclean, but now they are holy (1 Cor 7:14). These are encouraging words that were inspired by the one true Father of all.

Creation Corner

"God's Majestic World"

In the northern hemisphere of the world we are all anticipating a season called winter. What are you doing to prepare yourself for the cold and dark days that lie ahead? Maybe you could take some tips from some of God's spe-

cial animals, (Genesis 1:24-25), as they prepare and settle in for a phenomenon called hibernation.

Do you know why animals hibernate? Where is their place of hibernation and when do they begin to prepare? Do all animals hibernate? Let's take a snapshot look at hibernation and then you can do some work on your own.

Hiberna is a Latin word that means winter. Hibernation is a way for animals to save their energy and survive the winter when food is hard to find. Did you know that there are different levels of hibernation? One level is known as the" rea" hibernation where the



animals, or hibernators, sleep so deeply that it is almost impossible for them to awaken! The largest of the hibernators is the bear. They are not like the "real" hibernators because they can awaken easily and their body temperature will start to rise almost immediately.

The skunk and raccoon are examples of the "in-between' hibernators. They take long winter naps, but find time to search and store their food.



The last level is that called "daily dormants". A hummingbird is a good example of a daily dormant because it can only survive if it turns it's body temperature down into a minihibernation.

The bear, skunk and hummingbird, are all examples of the majesty of the world God created for us to enjoy. Hibernating is a way of survival for each of them, but they do it in different ways. The winter months can sometimes be long and harsh and each of the levels of hibernation ensures in some way that the species will survive.

After researching a little on my own about animals that hibernate I began asking myself questions. Are you wondering, too, about "winter sleep"? Do you hibernate during the short, cold, dark days of winter? Do you wonder if the

sun will ever come out? Do you long for the rays of sunshine to stream through your windows? You are probably not alone if you have any of these questions.



Maybe this year, though, you can approach winter with new eyes. First, look around you and actually "see" winter. It is a very beautiful season and each region of the United States experiences it differently. Take out your coat, gloves, hat, and scarf, if necessary, and go for a long walk. Use your senses and make a mental

list of what you observe around you. Remember the levels of hibernation? Next, create a list of animals that you know and try to categorize them into each of the levels of hibernation. If an animal does not hibernate, how does it survive the winter? Write your own book, with illustrations, of course, about winter, animals, hibernation, and survival.

Finally, if you are going to hibernate yourself, take God's word with you. Snuggle and bundle up from the cold of the outside world into the pages of His world that brims with abundant life. As Christians we need to remember to search the scriptures daily, (Acts 17:11), not only during the winter. But if you haven't, then let's get you back on track! Take advantage of the wintertime to schedule some time to study as a family. Maybe you can start by reading Genesis 1, and finding out more about God's majestic world of creation.

Before long I will be looking forward to the warmer days of spring, but in the meantime I will bury down, warm and safe, with the word of God close at hand. And I won't forget the hot chocolate!

Now on a positive note, there many singers and bands that do take their responsibility seriously and are careful about the lyrics in their songs and contents that are in their videos. They are aware that they are role models and want to be a positive one. It is worth your time to research modern rock groups and singers and discover those who can be positive role models for your child.

One example of a group that tries to be a positive role models is Sonic Flood who has a song entitled "Youth of a Nation." This song was to be a warning to teens and parents of the many problems in society that young people are going through.

Another example is a song by White Loin with a song entitled "When Children Cry." The lyrics spoke of how the present world governments are destructive with wars and mismanagement, but when God becomes king over this earth the "children will sing." Yes, it is like a religious song in many ways.

Here are a few tips to assist you with your child in picking music.

First, you can plan to go with your child to the music store and check out the music together. It would make you more aware of the type of music out there and when you do show disapproval of a song or lyrics then you can at least comment based on experience which will hold more weight with your child. Plus, you become more involved in your child's life, which many parents do not seem to do in today's society.

Second, you can try renting or borrowing music videos before you buy them for your child. This will prevent you from wasting money on music videos that you would not approve of.

In fact, you can even check out music and music videos at your local library to review. Many cities have libraries (such as Tulsa, OK) that allow you to check out movies and music at no cost. This is a great way to review entertainment materials

Third, you should monitor what you child is listening to on the internet. The internet can be great source for listening to music and watching videos and getting copies of song lyrics, but with the internet being so accessible it can be too easy for you child to watch videos with messages that you do not want them to see.

Fourth, you should introduce your child to many types of music so that his/her taste in music can be well rounded. You can easily broaden your child's taste and understanding in music by doing this. The earlier that you start introducing various types of music to your child, then the easier it will be for your child to choose and enjoy other types of music. You should remember that not all of your child's music is negative or has a negative influence, but you can assist them

in understanding what is appropriate and explain why. Do not forget that the music you listened to when you were a teen seemed rebellious to your parents. Try to be understanding with their music and if certain songs are inappropriate, explain to your child why so they can understand.

Be a parent and share with your child's interest in music.
